We are thrilled to have wrapped up another great year at Sistema Toronto. Working with 275 children, we helped students build their musical abilities while developing key social skills that will allow them to thrive as future leaders in their communities.

Toronto is a vibrant and diverse city, but it does not provide equal opportunities for all. At Sistema Toronto we work with families who face systematic barriers to success. Many of our families are from racialized and newcomer communities, and they face daily challenges with low-income, lack of quality education, and food insecurity. Our program helps families escape the cycle of poverty by offering free after-school childcare, music lessons, instruments, skills building, and a nutrition program to fight food scarcity.

We continue to see great progress in our students at all levels, both as musicians and well-rounded young leaders. This year we practiced teamwork, listening, respect, problem solving, responsibility, organization, communication, and leadership while learning strings, choir, theory, and percussion. Many of our students have also seen improvements in their academic abilities at school as a result of attending our program, and we're extremely proud of their accomplishments.

Our work would not be possible without the individuals, foundations, and corporations that share our values and donate in support of the children and families we serve. We truly believe in our vision of using the global language of music to help children grow and realize their full potential as engaged and responsible citizens, and hope you do too. This annual report highlights key information regarding our program as well as the impact of your support.

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MISSION AND VISION THE CHALLENGE

Sistema Toronto provides musical and intellectual opportunities to children in vulnerable communities, with the goal of transformative social change. We work with students ages 6-15 in neighbourhoods with some of Toronto's highest child poverty rates – Parkdale, Jane-Finch, and East Scarborough. Sistema Toronto students learn together in orchestras, percussion ensembles, and choirs while developing important life skills like problem solving, empathy, and communication. We provide students with instruction from professional musicians, instruments, performance opportunities, and a daily nutritious snack, all at no cost to participants' families. We build stronger communities by enabling children to overcome poverty, grow, and thrive as engaged citizens and future leaders.

Despite being an incredibly wealthy city, Toronto has the highest child poverty rate amongst large cities in Canada, and children of colour, Indigenous children, immigrants, children with disabilities, and children from single-parent families are more likely to experience poverty. <sup>1</sup>

One third of racialized children (33.3%) in Toronto live in low-income families, while in comparison 15.1% of non-racialized children live in poverty. <sup>2</sup>



Children who grow up in marginalized and low-income households are less likely to achieve academic and social success and are more likely to depend on social services, experience physical and mental health problems, and live in poverty as adults.

Humber River – Black Creek (Jane-Finch) and Scarborough –Guildwood (East Scarborough) are among the six neighbourhoods with the highest number of families waiting for subsidized housing in the city. <sup>3</sup>

Toronto parents spend an average of \$21,096 on child care annually, the highest rate of any Canadian city. 4

Housing costs have grown four times faster than income, and rent costs have grown two times faster than income over the last decade.





Furthermore, over the last 12 years, Toronto's wait list for social housing has increased by 68%. <sup>5</sup>





#### **OUR COMMUNITIES**

Sistema Toronto communities are in diverse neighbourhoods with wide wealth divides and high rates of child poverty. The students and families we serve face economic challenges and social disadvantages that result in difficulty accessing the limited opportunities available to them.

#### CORE PROGRAM DELIVERY

Sistema Toronto students learn together for ten hours each week developing important life skills while making music together in orchestras, choirs, and percussion ensembles. They receive a daily nutritious snack, musical instruments, and instruction all at no cost to participants' families.

Sistema Toronto's curricula keeps social learning as top priority, building well-rounded musicians, strong collaborators, and community leaders. When students graduate from Sistema Toronto's core program in grade 8, they are equipped with the communication skills, confidence, and grit they need to excel in high school, access opportunities, and escape generational poverty.

Sistema Toronto students start in our program as 6- and 7-year-olds and become their schools' top performers. They are more likely to score higher on standardized testing compared to their non-Sistema peers.



#### **CURRICULA DEVELOPMENT**

Sistema Toronto is continually evaluating and improving its program to ensure students are receiving the support they need to thrive. A successful three-year Ontario Trillium Foundation-supported curricula development project came to an end in the 2018-19 year.

Sistema Toronto developed a core curriculum in strings, percussion, choir, Music & Movement, and social development. The focus was on music learning outcomes and complementary social development goals that create fluidity between each subject and centre, and helps students achieve milestones so that they graduate with strong musicianship skills as well as social and academic skills.

This process has transformed our teaching and pedagogical approaches and helped us find more ways to increase student interest and engagement to learn music skills and social development skills by shifting teaching from a transactional approach to an experiential approach in learning.

#### PEDAGOGICAL APPROACH

Changing our pedagogical approach has centred around shifting from a transactional approach to an experiential approach to learning. Most of us learned through transactional learning, a teacher--centered method of teaching in which the teacher dispenses all knowledge, acts as the keeper of truth, and makes all evaluations of learning. Research on educational best practices show that social transformation is more likely to occur via experiential learning. Experiential learning is an interactive way for students to learn where students are asked questions (or ask questions themselves) that will lead them to knowledge. This method of learning encourages self-evaluation, the development of problem solving skills, and produces students who have the ability to think critically. When students can shift from obedient replicators of knowledge to problem-solving critical thinking knowledge-seekers, we can set them on the path for true social change and empowerment in the long term.

#### **SOCIAL CURRICULUM**

Sistema Toronto is first and foremost a social development program. To ensure students meet the social goals of the program in addition to music goals, the Sistema team developed a social curriculum with goals and outcomes to complement the music curricula. This is in contrast to other Sistema-inspired programs, which expect social outcomes like leadership, teamwork and self-regulation to naturally occur through music education. The first five years of Sistema Toronto demonstrated that this is not always the case. The social curriculum was created to help students intentionally develop these skills by focusing on a different social development theme each month in their music classes, taught through experiential learning.

#### **PRODUCTION AND MEDIA**

After a successful pilot program at Yorkwoods in 2017-18, the Production and Media initiative was extended to all Sistema Toronto centres for 2018-19, thanks to a grant from Toronto Foundation. Production and Media classes gave students the chance to extend their knowledge beyond music performance and learn about behind the scenes tasks such as concert production, promotion, social media, video editing, show scripting, and hosting. Students used tablets to help organize and design promotional materials, create videos for web promotion, and communicate efficiently with each other on tasks. This project also provided disadvantaged kids with access to relevant technology that many do not have in their homes. In order to be successful, students had to take on leadership roles and show tremendous teamwork and communication skills.

#### TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In addition to providing support for children and families, Sistema Toronto is committed to employment and professional development opportunities for artists and arts educators. Sistema Toronto's teaching team met 10 times for Professional Development sessions. These sessions created space for teachers to discuss issues that arise in classrooms, share ideas, and improve curricula so that our program evolves to meet the needs of the community.

#### MULTICULTURAL PROGRAMMING

Sistema Toronto is committed to providing programming that reflects the diversity of the communities we serve. Based on a 2017 study conducted by the Students Commission of Canada, 90% of our students identify as people of colour some identify as Indigenous.

In 2018-19, at least 50% of our repertoire was by women, Indigenous artists, or people of colour, and Sistema Toronto students took part in a variety of workshops focused on celebrating cultural diversity with professional musicians such as OKAN, Micheal Butch, and Alyssa Delbaere-Sawchuk.

#### **NUTRITION PROGRAM**

One in five households in Toronto experience food insecurity. Low wages and inadequate social assistance, combined with the high costs of housing, child care and other necessities, are substantial obstacles to accessing healthy food. 8

Children that come from food insecure households are more likely to experience poor mental and physical health, greater risk of chronic disease, nutrient inadequacies, and other long-term adverse health effects. It also negatively impacts their academic performance, which largely determines students' educational and professional opportunities later in life.

The Sistema Toronto Nutrition Program follows the Toronto District School Board's Healthy Food Guidelines. Each snack includes a serving of fruit or vegetables and one serving of either grain, protein or dairy.

#### KISHAUN

Kishaun is a long-time student of Sistema Toronto – Parkdale. Though he sometimes lacked motivation and struggled behaviourally in his first few years of the program, Sistema Toronto staff worked alongside his mom to make sure Kishaun knew he was supported in Sistema.

This was no small feat for someone who would watch his friends playing on the basketball courts after school while he struggled to motivate himself to play his cello. Despite some setbacks, Kishaun worked hard on his cello over the years. His mom ensured that he remain focused on coming to Sistema each day after school. Kishaun's dedication to be in Sistema really paid off. He became a leader, often encouraging other students to do their best. Kishaun joined the strings program at Etobicoke School of the Arts in Fall 2019, and continues to attend Sistema Toronto for Honours Orchestra.

Yeshi is a friend to everyone around her and has consistently shown her kindness and ability to lead others throughout her time at Sistema Toronto. She has developed into an excellent student over the years, balancing the challenges of homework, music practice, and friendship with apparent ease.
